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

"Church of Christ"

The designation, "Church of Christ," has been by some practically deified. We hear some brethren say, "I'm. Church of Christ." We hear and read of "Church of Christ" preachers, homes, congregations, camps, etc. Furthermore, in the minds of many, if a so-called "Church of Christ" does a thing, such lends peculiar sanctity to that which is done regardless of the character of the thing itself. In recent years, we have often called to the attention of the brethren that things we are now doing are the very things which we have condemned in denominational bodies all through the years. So many times we have received the classic reply, "Yes, but those are denominations and this is the Church of Christ."

We have never been able to understand why a "chorus" is right if used by a "Church of Christ" in services of worship and a "choir" wrong if used by a denomination in services of worship. We have never understood why it is right for "Churches of Christ" such as the ones at San Benito, Texas (where we labored more than twenty years ago) and Broadway in Lubbock, Texas to own and operate irrigated cotton farms for profit to provide money for the benevolent work of the church and wrong for the Woman's Missionary Society (or whatever it is called) or a Methodist Church to give a pie supper to raise money to pay for the support of the mission or benevolent work of their' church. We find great difficulty in understanding why it is right for the elders of a "Church of Christ" to constitute themselves a general board of missions or benevolence for the churches (such as is done in so-called "sponsoring churches") and wrong for Christian Churches to do their benevolence and missionary work through a general board of missions or benevolence which they organize under the title of "Missionary Society."

It takes more than a name to make a church a "church of Christ." We once had an inmate of a state institute for the mentally ill, garbed in overalls with a three day's growth of beard on his face, approach us at a small, grocery store and confidentially advise us that he was a detective. Somehow it never occurred to us to take him seriously. Neither are we much impressed with institutions calling themselves "Churches of Christ" or "Churches of God" which are at the same time characterized by doctrines and practices unknown to the church which we read about in the New Testament. A church calling itself "Church of Christ" assumes the obligation of duplicating in its life the church which we read about on the pages of the New Testament.

The Valley Station church makes every effort to duplicate the church our Lord built (Matt. 16:18). We urge you to make a complete investigation of our teaching and practice. If you find what we teach and practice is truth, we stand ready to assist you in your compliance with the Lord's plain teaching. If we are wrong, we urge you to show us the error of our ways. We will not be deliberately wrong about anything.
